Books are cultural products resulting from the many agendas and negotiations taking place in their publishing processes. With this in mind, we will discuss the various steps and actors involved in the making, publishing, distributing, translating, and reception of books.

This seminar includes tasks like required readings, group discussions, and bookshop mapping, among others.

Across the nation, statues were toppled, parks, schools, and streets renamed, and Confederate flags and symbols removed from public spaces. In this course, we will examine how such symbolic removals from public memory partake not in erasing but in revising national narratives that have long privileged a past of racism, slavery, and colonialism while it omitted the history of minorities and their ongoing struggles against oppression. From Christopher Columbus to Confederates, the course will trace the construction and deconstruction of myths and monuments in the United States. We will study statues as well as literary texts, films, textbooks, and public holidays in order to critically reflect on how the national past is remembered.

This seminar aims to introduce students to the study of serial television as well as the teen drama genre and explore the shows' impact on American popular culture and society. We will analyze classic and contemporary teen dramas from the 1990s to the present, examining the series' narrative structures, character archetypes, and thematic elements. After a theoretical, methodological, and historical introduction to television studies and a consideration of cinematic precursors (e.g. <i>Rebel Without a Cause</i> , <i>The Breakfast Club</i>), this class will cover—among others—series like <i>Beverly Hills, 90210</i> , <i>Dawson's Creek</i> , <i>The O.C.</i> , <i>Veronica Mars</i> , <i>Riverdale</i> , and <i>Euphoria</i> . Next to studying the shows' specific televisual elements (editing, camerawork, seriality, music, etc.) we will also discuss their take(s) on class, gender, and ethnicity, the significance of youth subcultures in teen narratives, as well as the way how the shows represent and shape U.S. consumer culture. Please be aware that this seminar involves a lot of watching television and requires the (temporary) subscription to streaming providers in order to watch the series we will discuss.

futurism of cultures of the African diaspora, embracing modes of storytelling that are derived from science fiction, and making use of fantastic, irreal, extravagant forms of artistic expression. Afrofuturism critiques the legacy of colonialism and enslavement by presenting a world in which reality is conceived in radically new ways and in defiance of the existing power structures and established formats of articulation. In this class, we will investigate the ramifications of Afrofuturism by looking at its manifestation in many different media and forms. We will be concerned with the musical experiments of the exceptional (and exceptionally weird) jazz musician Sun Ra, with the video art of John Akomfrah, the photography of Carrie Mae Weems, the multimedia storytelling of Janelle Monáe, films such as *Neptune Frost* (2021, dir. Saul Williams und Anisia Uzeyman), and other material. A final list of sources will be announced at the beginning of the semester.

Additionally, we will examine how it navigates concepts like falsehood, authenticity, and truth in narrating the self.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar

This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games. Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game *Missle Command* (1980), the jump-n-run *Super Mario Bros.* (1985), the action-adventure *Prince of Persia* (1989/90) and the first-person shooter *Doom* (1993),

as well as more recent indie games (such as *Stardew Valley*, 2016) and triple-A titles (like *Red Dead Redemption II*, 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).

Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).</p> <p>Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. Language and Gender

Kommentar	This course deals with the reciprocal relationship of language and gender – a topic situated within the broader field of sociolinguistics. We will look at how gender shapes language, i.e. the way language is used by the different sexes in terms of distinct genderlects as well as at how language shapes gender, i.e. the way language is used for women and men alike, so as to construct and maintain ideas of gender. This requires an in-depth look at key theoretical concepts and approaches both from the early feminist and from the more recent post-feminist eras. It thus will provide student teachers with an overview on fundamental theoretical, empirical as well as pedagogical areas that are involved in the process of teaching and learning EFL. Specifically, the course will cover: European and national language learning policies second language learning theories methods and principles of teaching EFL teaching intercultural communicative competence teaching receptive, productive, and mediation skills teaching language means (grammar and vocabulary) teaching literature implementing digitalization and modern media

We will also address the issue of heterogeneity in the EFL classroom by outlining means of internal differentiation and the educational mandate of inclusion. The promotion of (foreign) language learning as individual and collaborative achievement, developing learner- and learning-centred teaching, and supporting task-based learning will be focused on as particularly relevant issues for today's teaching of EFL. The main topics will be introduced, and they will be consolidated and deepened against the background of relevant research and some examples of good classroom practices.

The course is based on Grimm, N. et al. (2015). Purchasing this textbook is highly recommended.

An optional tutorial will be offered.

Kommentar	Racist and racializing approaches to Africa and the African diaspora tend to claim the backwardness of African cultures or persons of African descent. In response to such allegations, Black musicians, visual artists, and writers have insisted on the futurism of cultures of the African diaspora, embracing modes of storytelling that are derived from science fiction, and making use of fantastic, irreal, extravagant forms of artistic expression. Afrofuturism critiques the legacy of colonialism and enslavement by presenting a world in which reality is conceived in radically new ways and in defiance of the existing power structures and established formats of articulation. In this class, we will investigate the ramifications of Afrofuturism by looking at its manifestation in many different media and forms. We will be concerned with the musical experiments of the exceptional (and exceptionally weird) jazz musician Sun Ra, with the video art of John Akomfrah, the photography of Carrie Mae Weems, the multimedia storytelling of Janelle Monáe, films such as <i>Neptune Frost</i> (2021, dir. Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games. Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game *Missle Command* (1980), the jump-n'-run *Super Mario Bros.* (1985), the action-adventure *Prince of Persia* (1989/90) and the first-person shooter *Doom* (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as *Stardew Valley*, 2016) and triple-A titles (like *Red Dead Redemption II*, 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).

Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

The course will be divided into four parts: First, we will look at historical films and the 'memory work' of Hollywood cinema. More precisely, we will focus on the ways in which film provides memory narratives for the nation, negotiates the cultural memory of the Civil Rights Movement and traumatic events like the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Second, we will discuss how Hollywood remembers its own past and how it employs and codes 'pastness.' Third, we will examine films that have memory and the mind as its subject matter. And finally, we will study how

films, film scenes, cinemas, and cinemagoing shape audience memory and firmly situate film in the cultural imagination.

In this notoriously difficult book, Butler deconstructs foundational philosophical and psychoanalytic theories that naturalize the gender binary. Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from <i>Gender Trouble</i> with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). For instance, we will follow contemporary arguments about autotheory with its obsessive focus on author personas, but we will also revisit the writing about the death of the author. This class will not provide an overview of the different stages of theorization from the past to the present, but instead is concerned with how literary studies 'work,' and how students can engage with and employ theory in their own work. To this end, we will explore different modes of reading and of analysis, moving from critical inquiry to practical application.

US-American Periodical Cultures, 1800s to 1920s

Kommentar	This seminar explores the evolution of American print news media during the 19th and early 20 th centuries, focusing on transformations in the print media landscape of the time. Approaching the periodical press as both an agent and a mirror of larger modernization processes, the seminar considers different types of publication (such as the daily paper, the almanac, the literary magazine, or the Sunday paper and its supplements) and different types of content (from news reporting to advertising, literary texts, comics, and more) and their evolution between the early 1800s and the late 1920s. Kommentar Racist and racializing approaches to Africa and the African diaspora tend to claim the backwardness of African cultures or persons of African descent. In response to such allegations, Black musicians, visual artists, and writers have insisted on the futurism of cultures of the African diaspora, embracing modes of storytelling that are derived from science fiction, and making use of fantastic, unreal, extravagant forms of artistic expression. Afrofuturism critiques the legacy of colonialism and enslavement by presenting a world in which reality is conceived in radically new ways and in defiance of the existing power structures and established formats of articulation. In this class, we will investigate the ramifications of Afrofuturism by looking at its manifestation in many different media and forms. We will be concerned with the musical experiments of the exceptional (and exceptionally weird) jazz musician Sun Ra, with the video art of John Akomfrah, the photography of Carrie Mae Weems, the multimedia storytelling of Janelle Monáe, films such as *Neptune Frost* (2021, dir. Saul Williams und Anisia Uzeyman), and other material. A final list of sources will be announced at the beginning of the semester.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games.

Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game *Missle Command* (1980), the jump-n'-run *Super Mario Bros.* (1985), the action-adventure *Prince of Persia* (1989/90) and the first-person shooter *Doom* (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as *Stardew Valley*, 2016) and triple-A titles (like *Red Dead Redemption II*, 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).

Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

Second, we will discuss how Hollywood remembers its own past and how it employs and codes 'pastness.' Third, we will examine films that have memory and the mind as its subject matter. And finally, we will study how films, film scenes, cinemas, and cinemagoing shape audience memory and firmly situate film in the cultural imagination.

Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decentre European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from <i>Gender Trouble</i> with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). Approaching the periodical press as both an agent and a mirror of larger modernization processes, the seminar considers different types of publication (such as the daily paper, the almanac, the literary magazine, or the Sunday paper and its supplements) and different types of content (from news reporting to advertising, literary texts, comics, and more) and their evolution between the early 1800s and the late 1920s. In engaging with these materials, we will explore changes in the form and makeup of journals and newspapers as well as issues such as political partisanship, the everyday utility and unexpected political usage of formats such as the almanac, the impact of hoaxes and fraudulent reporting, the relationship between commerce and journalistic practices, and what happens when periodical forms are used for the (serialized) publication of literary texts. Throughout this seminar, readings of scholarly texts will be paired with the close in-class analysis of (digitally reproduced) historical magazines and newspapers.

Content note: In the service of our collective learning and growth, this course may include a variety of challenging and potentially sensitive topics. Lessons and course material containing such topics will be identified on the syllabus with a specific tag (e.g., CN: death). The murder of George Floyd by Minneapolis police officers in May 2020 sparked international outrage and revived controversies about Confederate monuments in the United States. Across the nation, statues were toppled, parks, schools, and streets renamed, and Confederate flags and symbols removed from public spaces. In this course, we will examine how such symbolic removals from public memory partake not in erasing but in revising national narratives that have long privileged a past of racism, slavery, and colonialism while it omitted the history of minorities and their ongoing struggles against oppression. From Christopher Columbus to Confederates, the course will trace the construction and deconstruction of myths and monuments in the United States. We will study statues as well as literary texts, films, textbooks, and public holidays in order to critically reflect on how the national past is remembered.

This seminar aims to introduce students to the study of serial television as well as the teen drama genre and explore the shows' impact on American popular culture and society. We will analyze classic and contemporary teen dramas from the 1990s to the present, examining the series' narrative structures, character archetypes, and thematic elements. After a theoretical, methodological, and historical introduction to television studies and a consideration of cinematic precursors (e.g. *Rebel Without a Cause*, *The Breakfast Club*), this class will cover—among others—series like *Beverly Hills, 90210*, *Dawson's Creek*, *The O.C.*, *Veronica Mars*, *Riverdale*, and *Euphoria*. Next to studying the shows' specific televisual elements (editing, camerawork, seriality, music, etc.) we will also discuss their take(s) on class, gender, and ethnicity, the significance of youth subcultures in teen narratives, as well as the way how the shows represent and shape U.S. consumer culture. Please be aware that this seminar involves a lot of watching television and requires the (temporary) subscription to streaming providers in order to watch the series we will discuss.

Kommentar Racist and racializing approaches to Africa and the African diaspora tend to claim the backwardness of African cultures or persons of African descent. In response to such allegations, Black musicians, visual artists, and writers have insisted on the futurism of cultures of the African diaspora, embracing modes of storytelling that are derived from science fiction, and making use of fantastic, irreal, extravagant forms of artistic expression. Afrofuturism critiques the legacy of colonialism and enslavement by presenting a world in which reality is conceived in radically new ways and in defiance of the existing power structures and established formats of articulation. In this class, we will investigate the ramifications of Afrofuturism by looking at its manifestation in many different media and forms. We will be concerned with the musical experiments of the exceptional (and exceptionally weird) jazz musician Sun Ra, with the video art of John Akomfrah, the photography of Carrie Mae Weems, the multimedia storytelling of Janelle Monáe, films such as *Neptune Frost* (2021, dir. Saul Williams und Anisia Uzeyman), and other material. A final list of sources will be announced at the beginning of the semester.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games. Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game *Missle Command* (1980), the jump-n-run *Super Mario Bros.* (1985), the action-adventure *Prince of Persia* (1989/90) and the first-person shooter *Doom* (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as *Stardew Valley*, 2016) and triple-A titles (like *Red Dead Redemption II*, 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).

Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

More precisely, we will focus on the ways in which film provides memory narratives for the nation, negotiates the cultural memory of the Civil Rights Movement and traumatic events like the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Second, we will discuss how Hollywood remembers its own past and how it employs and codes 'pastness.' Third, we will examine films that have memory and the mind as its subject matter. And finally, we will study how films, film scenes, cinemas, and cinemagoing shape audience memory and firmly situate film in the cultural imagination.

Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from *Gender Trouble* with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). All texts will be made available on Stud.IP.

For instance, we will follow contemporary arguments about autotheory with its obsessive focus on author personas, but we will also revisit the writing about the death of the author. This class will not provide an overview of the different stages of theorization from the past to the present, but instead is concerned with how literary studies ‘work,’ and how students can engage with and employ theory in their own work. To this end, we will explore different modes of reading and of analysis, moving from critical inquiry to practical application.

US-American Periodical Cultures, 1800s to 1920s

Kommentar This seminar explores the evolution of American print news media during the 19th and early 20th centuries, focusing on transformations in the print media landscape of the time. Approaching the periodical press as both an agent and a mirror of larger modernization processes, the seminar considers different types of publication (such as the daily paper, the almanac, the literary magazine, or the Sunday paper and its supplements) and different types of content (from news reporting to advertising, literary texts, comics, and more) and their evolution between the early 1800s and the late 1920s. In engaging with these materials, we will explore changes in the form and makeup of journals and newspapers as well as issues such as political partisanship, the everyday utility and unexpected political usage of formats such as the almanac, the impact of hoaxes and fraudulent reporting, the relationship between commerce and journalistic practices, and what happens when periodical forms are used for the (serialized) publication of literary texts. Throughout this seminar, readings of scholarly texts will be paired with the close in-class analysis of (digitally reproduced) historical magazines and newspapers.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar	This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games. Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game <i>Missle Command</i> (1980), the jump-n-run <i>Super Mario Bros.</i> (1985), the action-adventure <i>Prince of Persia</i> (1989/90) and the first-person shooter <i>Doom</i> (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as <i>Stardew Valley</i> , 2016) and triple-A titles (like <i>Red Dead Redemption II</i> , 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).
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Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HII-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

More precisely, we will focus on the ways in which film provides memory narratives for the nation, negotiates the cultural memory of the Civil Rights Movement and traumatic events like the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Second, we will discuss how Hollywood remembers its own past and how it employs and codes 'pastness.' Third, we will examine films that have memory and the mind as its subject matter. And finally, we will study how films, film scenes, cinemas, and cinemagoing shape audience memory and firmly situate film in the cultural imagination.

Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from *Gender Trouble* with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). Kommentar This course combines the study of literary theory with the engagement with different methods of literary analysis. We will follow contemporary debates about theory and method in literary studies, and we will turn to theories of the twentieth century to help us understand the ways in which earlier approaches remain relevant or tend to be challenged. For instance, we will follow contemporary arguments about autotheory with its obsessive focus on author personas, but we will also revisit the writing about the death

of the author. This class will not provide an overview of the different stages of theorization from the past to the present, but instead is concerned with how literary studies ‘work,’ and how students can engage with and employ theory in their own work. To this end, we will explore different modes of reading and of analysis, moving from critical inquiry to practical application.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game *Missle Command* (1980), the jump-n'-run *Super Mario Bros.* (1985), the action-adventure *Prince of Persia* (1989/90) and the first-person shooter *Doom* (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as *Stardew Valley*, 2016) and triple-A titles (like *Red Dead Redemption II*, 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).

Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar	This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games. Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game <i>Missle Command</i> (1980), the jump-n-run <i>Super Mario Bros.</i> (1985), the action-adventure <i>Prince of Persia</i> (1989/90) and the first-person shooter <i>Doom</i> (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as <i>Stardew Valley</i> , 2016) and triple-A titles (like <i>Red Dead Redemption II</i> , 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).
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Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HII-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

And finally, we will study how films, film scenes, cinemas, and cinemagoing shape audience memory and firmly situate film in the cultural imagination.

We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from *Gender Trouble* with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). Kommentar	This seminar explores the evolution of American print news media during the 19th and early 20 th centuries, focusing on transformations in the print media landscape of the time. Approaching the periodical press as both an agent and a mirror of larger modernization processes, the seminar considers different types of publication (such as the daily paper, the almanac, the literary magazine, or the Sunday paper and its supplements) and different types of content (from news reporting to advertising, literary texts, comics, and more) and their evolution between the early 1800s and the late 1920s. In engaging with these materials, we will explore changes in the form and makeup of journals and newspapers as well as issues such as political partisanship, the everyday utility and unexpected political usage of formats such as the almanac, the impact of hoaxes and fraudulent reporting, the relationship between commerce and journalistic practices, and what happens when periodical forms are used for the (serialized) publication of literary texts. Throughout this seminar, readings of scholarly texts will be paired with the close in-class analysis of (digitally reproduced) historical magazines and newspapers.

The materiality of literary works has often been neglected in scholarly traditions of textual analysis, which tend to focus on the content of a book more than on its packaging. Addressing this, this seminar aims to discuss the many elements that allow us (i.e., readers) to see, hold, and read literature, eventually influencing the way we approach and interpret the books that we consume. Moreover, this seminar examines how literary works are shaped by the different intermediaries and dynamics operating in the publishing industry. Books are cultural products resulting from the many agendas and negotiations taking place in their publishing processes. With this in mind, we will discuss the various steps and actors involved in the making, publishing, distributing, translating, and reception of books.

This seminar includes tasks like required readings, group discussions, and bookshop mapping, among others.

Kommentar The murder of George Floyd by Minneapolis police officers in May 2020 sparked international outrage and revived controversies about Confederate monuments in the United States. Across the nation, statues were toppled, parks, schools, and streets renamed, and Confederate flags and symbols removed from public spaces. In this course, we will examine how such symbolic removals from public memory partake not in erasing but in revising national narratives that have long privileged a past of racism, slavery, and colonialism while it omitted the history of minorities and their ongoing struggles against oppression. From Christopher Columbus to Confederates, the course will trace the construction and deconstruction of myths and monuments in the United

States. We will study statues as well as literary texts, films, textbooks, and public holidays in order to critically reflect on how the national past is remembered.

Kommentar	Through its combination of coming-of-age narratives and classic televisual genres (drama, soap opera, comedy), the contemporary teen drama has become one of the most distinct genres of U.S. television. This seminar aims to introduce students to the study of serial television as well as the teen drama genre and explore the shows' impact on American popular culture and society. We will analyze classic and contemporary teen dramas from the 1990s to the present, examining the series' narrative structures, character archetypes, and thematic elements. After a theoretical, methodological, and historical introduction to television studies and a consideration of cinematic precursors (e.g. <i>Rebel Without a Cause</i> , <i>The Breakfast Club</i>), this class will cover—among others—series like <i>Beverly Hills, 90210</i> , <i>Dawson's Creek</i> , <i>The O.C.</i> , <i>Veronica Mars</i> , <i>Riverdale</i> , and <i>Euphoria</i> . Next to studying the shows' specific televisual elements (editing, camerawork, seriality, music, etc.) we will also discuss their take(s) on class, gender, and ethnicity, the significance of youth subcultures in teen narratives, as well as the way how the shows represent and shape U.S. consumer culture. Please be aware that this seminar involves a lot of watching television and requires the (temporary) subscription to streaming providers in order to watch the series we will discuss.

Kommentar	This BritF3 seminar accompanies the BritF2 Survey on British Literatures and Cultures. Participation in the BritF2 lecture series (Vorlesung) is mandatory in order to profit from the various exercises conducted in this BritF3 seminar. Practising the analytical terms and concepts acquired in the AmerBritF1 Introduction, we will read selected literary texts addressed in the Survey lecture and explore their representations of race, class and

gender in their respective historical and generic contexts. Our particular focus will be on Shakespeare's tragedy *Othello* (entire play) and Daniel Defoe's novel *Robinson Crusoe* (longer excerpts). We will thus investigate how texts and paintings have contributed to shape an understanding of British history and culture. To achieve this objective, students will work with definitions of terms and concepts by using relevant specialist literature, such as encyclopedias, dictionaries, websites and scholarly texts.

The materiality of literary works has often been neglected in scholarly traditions of textual analysis, which tend to focus on the content of a book more than on its packaging. Addressing this, this seminar aims to discuss the many elements that allow us (i.e., readers) to see, hold, and read literature, eventually influencing the way

we approach and interpret the books that we consume. Moreover, this seminar examines how literary works are shaped by the different intermediaries and dynamics operating in the publishing industry. Books are cultural products resulting from the many agendas and negotiations taking place in their publishing processes. With this in mind, we will discuss the various steps and actors involved in the making, publishing, distributing, translating, and reception of books.

This seminar includes tasks like required readings, group discussions, and bookshop mapping, among others.

Kommentar	The murder of George Floyd by Minneapolis police officers in May 2020 sparked international outrage and revived controversies about Confederate monuments in the United States. Across the nation, statues were toppled, parks, schools, and streets renamed, and Confederate flags and symbols removed from public spaces. In this course, we will examine how such symbolic removals from public memory partake not in erasing but in revising national narratives that have long privileged a past of racism, slavery, and colonialism while it omitted the history of minorities and their ongoing struggles against oppression. From Christopher Columbus to Confederates, the course will trace the construction and deconstruction of myths and monuments in the United States. We will study statues as well as literary texts, films, textbooks, and public holidays in order to critically reflect on how the national past is remembered.

Kommentar	Through its combination of coming-of-age narratives and classic televisual genres (drama, soap opera, comedy), the contemporary teen drama has become one of the most distinct genres of U.S. television. This seminar aims to introduce students to the study of serial television as well as the teen drama genre and explore the shows' impact on American popular culture and society. We will analyze classic and contemporary
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teen dramas from the 1990s to the present, examining the series' narrative structures, character archetypes, and thematic elements. After a theoretical, methodological, and historical introduction to television studies and a consideration of cinematic precursors (e.g. *Rebel Without a Cause*, *The Breakfast Club*), this class will cover—among others—series like *Beverly Hills, 90210*, *Dawson's Creek*, *The O.C.*, *Veronica Mars*, *Riverdale*, and *Euphoria*. Next to studying the shows' specific televisual elements (editing, camerawork, seriality, music, etc.) we will also discuss their take(s) on class, gender, and ethnicity, the significance of youth subcultures in teen narratives, as well as the way how the shows represent and shape U.S. consumer culture. Please be aware that this seminar involves a lot of watching television and requires the (temporary) subscription to streaming providers in order to watch the series we will discuss.

Kommentar Racist and racializing approaches to Africa and the African diaspora tend to claim the backwardness of African cultures or persons of African descent. In response to such allegations, Black musicians, visual artists, and writers have insisted on the futurism of cultures of the African diaspora, embracing modes of storytelling that are derived from science fiction, and making use of fantastic, irreal, extravagant forms of artistic expression. Afrofuturism critiques the legacy of colonialism and enslavement by presenting a world in which reality is conceived in radically new ways and in defiance of the existing power structures and established formats of articulation. In this class, we will investigate the ramifications of Afrofuturism by looking at its manifestation in many different media and forms. We will be concerned with the musical experiments of the exceptional (and exceptionally weird) jazz musician Sun Ra, with the video art of John Akomfrah, the photography of Carrie Mae Weems, the multimedia storytelling of Janelle Monáe, films such as *Neptune Frost* (2021, dir. Saul Williams und Anisia Uzeyman), and other material. A final list of sources will be announced at the beginning of the semester.

Kommentar Autofiction is a term that has recently emerged in the literary landscape to describe works that blend the genres of fiction and autobiography, often reflecting or drawing inspiration from the author's real-life events. In this course, we will explore contemporary US literature to understand the unique formal and aesthetic qualities of autofiction. We will address questions such as: What is autofiction? How does it engage with identity and forms of representation? How does this genre influence our understanding of self-formation in contemporary literature? Additionally, we will examine how it navigates concepts like falsehood, authenticity, and truth in narrating the self.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar	This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games. Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game <i>Missle Command</i> (1980), the jump-n-run <i>Super Mario Bros.</i> (1985), the action-adventure <i>Prince of Persia</i> (1989/90) and the first-person shooter <i>Doom</i> (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as <i>Stardew Valley</i> , 2016) and triple-A titles (like <i>Red Dead Redemption II</i> , 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).
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Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

More precisely, we will focus on the ways in which film provides memory narratives for the nation, negotiates the cultural memory of the Civil Rights Movement and traumatic events like the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Second, we will discuss how Hollywood remembers its own past and how it employs and codes 'pastness.' Third, we will examine films that have memory and the mind as its subject matter. And finally, we will study how films, film scenes, cinemas, and cinemagoing shape audience memory and firmly situate film in the cultural imagination.

In this notoriously difficult book, Butler deconstructs foundational philosophical and psychoanalytic theories that naturalize the gender binary. Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from <i>Gender Trouble</i> with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). All texts will be made available on Stud.IP.

Kommentar	This course combines the study of literary theory with the engagement with different methods of literary analysis. We will follow contemporary debates about theory and method in literary studies, and we will turn to theories of the twentieth century to help us understand the ways in which earlier approaches remain relevant or tend to be challenged. For instance, we will follow contemporary arguments about autotheory with its obsessive focus on author personas, but we will also revisit the writing about the death of the author. This class will not provide an overview of the different stages of theorization from the past to the present, but instead is concerned with how literary studies 'work,' and how students can engage with and employ theory in their own work. To this end, we will explore different modes of reading and of analysis, moving from critical inquiry to practical application.

US-American Periodical Cultures, 1800s to 1920s

Kommentar	This seminar explores the evolution of American print news media during the 19th and early 20 th centuries, focusing on transformations in the print media landscape of the time. Approaching the periodical press as both an agent and a mirror of larger modernization processes, the seminar considers different types of publication (such as the daily paper, the almanac, the literary magazine, or the Sunday paper and its supplements) and different types of content (from news reporting to advertising, literary texts, comics, and more) and their evolution between the early 1800s and the late 1920s. In engaging with these materials, we will explore changes in the form and makeup of journals and newspapers as well as issues such as political partisanship, the everyday utility and unexpected political usage of formats such as the almanac, the impact of hoaxes and fraudulent reporting, the relationship between commerce and journalistic practices, and what happens when periodical forms are used for the (serialized) publication of literary texts. Throughout this seminar, readings of scholarly texts will be paired with the close in-class analysis of (digitally reproduced) historical magazines and newspapers.

Kommentar	In this seminar, we will examine a selection of recently published literary texts, which were nominated for or which won the prestigious British Booker Prize or the Women's Prize for Fiction. We will begin by reading and discussing the dystopian novel <i>The Prophet Song</i> (2023) by the Irish author Paul Lynch, which won the Booker Prize in 2023. Building on scholarly investigations of literary prizes, students will analyse a selection of novels in small groups. For the non-graded coursework, each group will create a booklet about their selected novel, including a literary review and study questions for our seminar discussions chaired by the individual groups.
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Please familiarise yourself with the official websites of the Booker Prize and the Women's Prize for Fiction. At the beginning of the semester, we will decide which other primary texts we will read throughout the course. Kommentar Racist and racializing approaches to Africa and the African diaspora tend to claim the backwardness of African cultures or persons of African descent. In response to such allegations, Black musicians, visual artists, and writers have insisted on the futurism of cultures of the African diaspora, embracing modes of storytelling that are derived from science fiction, and making use of fantastic, irreal, extravagant forms of artistic expression. Afrofuturism critiques the legacy of colonialism and enslavement by presenting a world in which reality is conceived in radically new ways and in defiance of the existing power structures and established formats of articulation. In this class, we will investigate the ramifications of Afrofuturism by looking at its manifestation in many different media and forms. We will be concerned with the musical experiments of the exceptional (and exceptionally weird) jazz musician Sun Ra, with the video art of John Akomfrah, the photography of Carrie Mae Weems, the multimedia storytelling of Janelle Monáe, films such as *Neptune Frost* (2021, dir. Saul Williams und Anisia Uzeyman), and other material. A final list of sources will be announced at the beginning of the semester.

Additionally, we will examine how it navigates concepts like falsehood, authenticity, and truth in narrating the self.

Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Kommentar	This seminar offers an introduction to the history and analytic study of digital games. Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game <i>Missle Command</i> (1980), the jump-n'-run <i>Super Mario Bros.</i> (1985), the action-adventure <i>Prince of Persia</i> (1989/90) and the first-person shooter <i>Doom</i> (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as <i>Stardew Valley</i> , 2016) and triple-A titles (like <i>Red Dead Redemption II</i> , 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).
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Please note: Participants will have to buy one or two (moderately priced) indie games to participate. If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). More details on these requirements will be shared at the start of the teaching term.

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traumatic events like the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Second, we will discuss how Hollywood remembers its own past and how it employs and codes ‘pastness.’ Third, we will examine films that have memory and the mind as its subject matter. And finally, we will study how films, film scenes, cinemas, and cinemagoing shape audience memory and firmly situate film in the cultural imagination.

Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from <i>Gender Trouble</i> with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). For instance, we will follow contemporary arguments about autotheory with its obsessive focus on author personas, but we will also revisit the writing about the death of the author. This class will not provide an overview of the different stages of theorization from the past to the present, but instead is concerned with how literary studies 'work,' and how students can engage with and employ theory in their own work. To this end, we will explore different modes of reading and of analysis, moving from critical inquiry to practical application.

US-American Periodical Cultures, 1800s to 1920s

Kommentar	This seminar explores the evolution of American print news media during the 19th and early 20 th centuries, focusing on transformations in the print media landscape of the time. Approaching the periodical press as both an agent and a mirror of larger modernization processes, the seminar considers different types of publication (such as the daily paper, the almanac, the literary magazine, or the Sunday paper and its supplements) and different types of content (from news reporting to advertising, literary texts, comics, and more) and their evolution between the early 1800s and the late 1920s. In engaging with these materials, we will explore changes in the form and makeup of journals and newspapers as well as issues such as political partisanship, the everyday utility and unexpected political usage of formats such as the almanac, the impact of hoaxes and fraudulent reporting, the relationship between commerce and journalistic practices, and what happens when periodical forms are used for the (serialized) publication of literary texts. Throughout this seminar, readings of scholarly texts will be paired with the close in-class analysis of (digitally reproduced) historical magazines and newspapers.

Part of the class will be dedicated to the topic of linguistic sexism and the call for prescriptivist measurements in terms of an attempt to achieve political correctness through inclusive language.

Kommentar	We have seen an increase in the use of digital media in the EFL classroom in recent years, which is partly due to the pandemic and the resulting remote learning students and teachers had to face. Most schools have already introduced digital devices as a way to promote digital literacy at schools. This seminar will look at chances and limits of using student-owned iPads in the EFL classroom. Based on the core curriculum of Lower Saxony (2015/21), we will develop materials for EFL students in Year 8 based on the graphic novel <i>Illegal</i> by Eoin Colfer and Andrew Donkin (2017). Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from *Gender Trouble* with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). Digital Games and Game Studies in the US, 1980 to Today

Focusing on the period between 1980 and today, the seminar examines old and new games from a variety of different genres and platforms – including classics such as the arcade game *Missle Command* (1980), the jump-n'-run *Super Mario Bros.* (1985), the action-adventure *Prince of Persia* (1989/90) and the first-person shooter *Doom* (1993), as well as more recent indie games (such as *Stardew Valley*, 2016) and triple-A titles (like *Red Dead Redemption II*, 2018). Aiming to familiarize participants with key concepts in, and approaches to, the study of digital games, the seminar will pair the playing and discussion of games with the study of historical and contemporary game studies literature. Seminar participants will explore the potential tensions between the narrative and ludic (or gameplay-centric) dimensions of video games, consider the importance of platforms and play contexts (including the differences between arcade, console, and PC games), come to terms with the cultural impact of games and gaming as a multi-billion-dollar industry, consider games' (at times problematic) politics of representation, and discuss how gaming culture has in recent years become a site of political conflict (something exemplified by right-wing mobilizations around 2015's so-called Gamergate controversy).

If feasible, the seminar will include a trip to the HI-SCORE video games museum and arcade (which is currently relocating to a new venue). Kommentar	Autofiction is a term that has recently emerged in the literary landscape to describe works that blend the genres of fiction and autobiography, often reflecting or drawing inspiration from the author's real-life events. This genre foregrounds notions of self-discovery, individuality, emotional truth(s), and subjectivity. In this course, we will explore contemporary US literature to understand the unique formal and aesthetic qualities of autofiction. We will address questions such as: What is autofiction? How does it engage with identity and forms of representation? How does this genre influence our understanding of self-formation in contemporary literature? Additionally, we will examine how it navigates concepts like falsehood, authenticity, and truth in narrating the self.

Kommentar	This class borrows its title from Judith Butler's foundational queer theory intervention, <i>Gender Trouble: Feminism and the Subversion of Identity</i> (1990). In this notoriously difficult book, Butler deconstructs foundational philosophical and psychoanalytic theories that naturalize the gender binary. Through course discussions, we will collectively decode Butler's philosophical text and consider its relevance over 30 years after it was published. We will also further decenter European and Euro-American philosophical foundations, by pairing selections from <i>Gender Trouble</i> with fiction (such as Octavia Butler's "Bloodchild") and key texts from critical Indigenous studies and Black studies (such as writings by Margaret Kovach and Hortense Spillers). All texts will be made available on Stud.IP.
